

History of the Manor Hotel

The earliest image we have is from 1865 when a family called the Proctors owned The Manor. This elevation is now the entrance to Marco Pierre White Steakhouse, to the left of the main hotel.



By 1900 the house was owned by the Goodman family.



The building was tidied up for sale in 1949.....

Resembling a little more as the building looks today, this image is from 1994, with the addition of a bedroom block to the rear facing stables. The front entrance as we see it today, is yet to be built.



The addition of the main hotel entrance almost as we see it today, was completed in 1996. Bought by Mr Roy Richards, the owner of the National Motorcycle Museum, to support the event business at his National Conference Centre, just a few miles up the road.



Additional bedrooms were also added in the late 1990's. Originally called the Princess Diana Wing, this was altered to the Princess Wing out of respect, after her untimely death and is now commonly known as 'P' Wing.





The Manor as we see it today, with entrances to the main hotel and Marco Pierre White Steakhouse, Bar & Grill. Privately owned by the Hartland Family, inherited from Mr Richards.

Although still very much linked to the NMM, NCC & The Windmill Village Hotel Golf Club & Spa through ownership, the Manor Hotel today stands alone in offering 4 star hotel, conference and dining facilities to it's clients.
